



Quarterly Update

April 2014



OVER THE LAST YEAR, more than 2,000 children in Rwanda and Haiti have been receiving “One Egg” every day that they attend school. This would not have happened without all of you who have been part of the OneEgg story.

As we look toward the future, with a new three-year vision for OneEgg, we are excited about the possibilities. The number of local partners around the world who have been interested in launching a OneEgg chapter has been amazing. We have considered India, the Philippines, Columbia, Malawi, Mozambique and Zimbabwe...just to name a few.

In late 2013, we decided to invest deeply in three OneEgg chapters. The goal of OneEgg is to provide **“More Eggs 2 More Kids.”** Although spreading our efforts around the globe is exciting, we believe the best opportunity we have right now to have the maximum impact on the greatest number of children is investing in the people, process and infrastructure in the following chapters.



RWANDA

In three years, OneEgg Rwanda has expanded to provide eggs to more than 1,500 children at 15 preschools. The operation is running very well and is governed by policies and processes to ensure 100% of all support directed to the purchase and deliver of eggs. With this foundation in place, we are dedicated to providing **“More Eggs 2 More Kids”** by expanding the sponsorship program to serve some of the additional 18,000 children who are part of the pre-school program but are not receiving eggs.



HAITI

In 2013, two partners with extensive development experience in Haiti launched a pilot to prove the OneEgg model in this beautiful yet challenging environment. Nearly 500 children have been receiving eggs at six preschools. As the pilot concludes, the commitment is strong and the potential is great to expand to another 500 or more children in 2014.



UGANDA

In some parts of the world where eggs are not available, we find partners to invest in “for profit” farms that create jobs and provide egg supply. After extensive planning, an investment was made



in Northern Uganda. Five acres of land were purchased, and last month we broke ground on a new farm. The current plan is to complete the first farmhouse and place chicks by July 1. RESEARCH

Finally, I wanted to update everyone on a research project taking place in Uganda. With the support of the American Egg Board and a partnership with The University of Arkansas, we have started a project to isolate and identify the impact eggs have on children who otherwise would not have access to animal protein. Although we consistently see the impact in our before and after measurements of children who receive eggs, with the project in Uganda we have opportunity to influence larger government policy with accredited, published research. The initial results are very encouraging, and we will have more details later this summer.
